## SPECIAL CHARACTER OF ST MARY'S COLLEGE

At St Mary's College, our aim is to develop young women of Mercy. Our Catholic Character is woven into every facet of College life. The Special Character programme draws deeply on the values of the Gospel and the spirit of Mercy. The Special Character of St Mary's College is its reason for existence. It is enshrined in the Private Schools Conditional Integration Act and is a legislative requirement. It is the "heartbeat" and soul of the school.

## **SCHOOL MASS**

Several times a year the whole school celebrates Mass together either at school or at St Patrick's Cathedral. Each junior Religious Education class, supported by senior students, prepares a Thursday lunchtime Mass throughout the year. The class Mass roster is advertised to families. ## PASTORAL

The Pastoral Care Team is led by Deputy Principal, Elena Grant, and includes Deans, Learning Support, Counsellors, Careers Advisors and the School Nurse.

The Mercy Tradition 'love in action' is a key to the conduct and discipline expected at St Mary's College. Through affirmation of positive qualities of each student, we aim to produce articulate, vibrant, confident, self-disciplined, and motivated Christian women with strong leadership qualities.

The Pastoral Network in the College works to ensure the care and welfare of all our students. Although all teachers in the school contribute to the well-being of students, members of the Pastoral Network have responsibility in this area.

## DEANS

The school is divided into year levels, Year 7 to Year 13, with each level being managed by a Dean. We are pleased to advise that the 2025 Year 7 Dean is <u>Miss Monique Williams</u>. The Dean for each level is responsible for the overall pastoral and administrative needs and care of the students. Deans for 2025 will be announced at the beginning of the school year.

## **FORM TEACHERS**

The Form Teacher forms the basis of the network and plays the major role in providing for the pastoral care of students in their class. Each year level Dean works closely with Form and Class Teachers.

## **LEARNING SUPPORT**

The Learning Support team provides support for students with additional learning needs. We recognise that our students are unique and present with a wide range of learning needs. We acknowledge and respect their individual strengths and challenges. In responding to this diversity, we are constantly researching alternative teaching approaches and strategies to enhance our students' success. Our progress and interventions are discussed and reviewed by a multi-disciplinary team during our fortnightly Diverse Needs meetings. Students and Parents are able to access information such as their daughter's timetable, academic record, attendance, a calendar of events through the KAMAR Portal All students and parents will be issued a Parent Portal username and password at the start of the 2025 school year. Parent logins also have access to Fees/Contributions and school reports.

## SCHOOLBRIDGE

At St Mary's College we use SchoolBridge to manage student forms and permission letters. The system is integrated with KAMAR, ensuring an efficient and paperless experience for both parents and the school.

## NEWSLETTER

We believe you should be well informed about the College. Each week you will be emailed the College newsletter. The newsletter contains information about college activities, term and examination dates, parent evenings, community notices and other matters of interest to parents. Please ensure the office has your most recent email address.

## **REPORTING TO PARENTS**

During the year there will be opportunities to meet staff and discuss student progress. The dates, once finalised, will be advertised in the College newsletter. Written reports are also completed and shared with parents throughout the year, the dates will be advised.

## **BRING YOUR OWN DEVICE PROGRAMME**

We have a bring your own device (BYOD) programme for Year 8 to Year 13 students where a limited range of devices are recommended. Information will be sent out to new students in these year levels.

Students are required to sign the Cyber Safety policy which states the procedures that they need to consistently follow to be a good digital citizen of St Mary's College.

The Form Teacher will set up and monitor a Form Class TEAMS. Students are not to set up their own St Mary's College Form Class chat groups.



## STUDENT CODE OF CONDUCT

The Student Code of Conduct which is published in the student handbook is a condition of entry into St Mary's College stating the underlying principles that students show respect for others and do quality work. These include the expectation that students respect staff, other students, property, the school uniform and that they attend school each day and all classes punctually. They must be equipped for all lessons, do quality work and the homework set in each subject and always behave responsibly when representing the school.

## Student Code of Conduct -

Classroom rules: a) show respect for others b) do quality work

I will work to the best of my ability.

I will respect the right of others to learn.

I will respect the person and property of every other member of the school community.

I will care for the school environment. This includes the grounds and shared spaces such as bathrooms and locker areas.

I will show courtesy and respect towards all staff, and I will meet all their requirements in and out of the classroom.

I will arrive at school on time and attend all classes punctually.

I will wear my school uniform correctly and tidily, with pride at all times. This includes during the day, travelling to and from school, and events I attend after school hours.

I will be properly equipped for all lessons and do the homework set in each subject.

I will not bring into the school grounds or buildings: alcohol, drugs, offensive or dangerous weapons, cigarettes (including vapes), lighters or matches or use them on any school occasion, or at any time when I am wearing my school uniform.

I will behave responsibly when representing the school and will obey the rules set for school teams and functions.

I will travel to and from school by the most direct route without stopping unnecessarily.

I will be courteous and helpful to school visitors and to members of the public, on the street and in public transport.

I will not bring gum to school, and I will not chew gum while at school or while in uniform.

I will ensure that my personal property such as mobile phones and headphones are not to be used or seen during class, without explicit permission from the teacher.

I will obtain permission from the school before I drive a car to school.

I will not leave the school grounds without permission during the school day. This includes to shift my parked car.

I will take responsibility for my personal property.

I will keep my passwords private and confidential.

I will respect staff and students in my digital space. This includes when I am using social media and group chats.

Parent/Caregivers are reminded that the enrolment form is a legal document and that a condition of enrolment is that the student is fully prepared to abide by the rules of the school.

## **GENERAL SCHOOL INFORMATION**

## **ABSENCES/UNABLE TO ATTEND SCHOOL**

Absences can be submitted via SchoolBridge or emailed to <u>attendance@stmaryak.school.nz</u> or phone 376 6568 press 778 by 8.15am. State your daughter's Name, Form Class, and the reason for the absence. Please bring a note of absence to the office or your Form Teacher on return to school.

## **APPOINTMENTS**

We discourage appointments during school time. However, should one during school time have to be made we require a note from Parent/Caregiver. Please request a leave pass via SchoolBridge or by email to <u>attendance@stmaryak.school.nz</u> and copy in your Year Level Dean. A leave pass will be issued. Students must sign out at the office before leaving school and sign in should they return. Students who are in Year 7 & 8 **must** be collected by the parent or adult named in the note.

## **CELL PHONES**

If students choose to bring a cell phone to school, it is the responsibility of each student to ensure the security of these during school hours. Students may only use their phone before the 8.35am bell and after school. This also applies to earphones/buds/pods. If a student is seen using a mobile phone during class time or during a break, it will be confiscated and given to the office. If the student has had the phone confiscated one or two times, they may retrieve it at the end of the day from the office. If it has been confiscated three or more times the Parent/Caregiver will be notified and will need to collect it. During class, when students request to go to the bathroom, they need to use the sign-out register and place their mobile phones on the teacher's desk. Once they have returned to class, they can collect their mobile phones and sign back in. If you need to communicate with their Parent/Caregiver during the school day, it needs to be done via the school office. If Parents/Caregiver needs to contact student, please email the school office.

## ILLNESS/ACCIDENTS/INJURIES WHILE AT SCHOOL

Report to the school nurse between 9.00am-3.10pm, Monday-Friday. Outside these times go to the school office. If you are unwell during school time, you will need to get a nurse pass from your teacher before leaving class. The nurse will assess you and will contact parents if needed.

## LATE FOR SCHOOL

Parent/Caregivers can advise that their daughter will be late via SchoolBridge or email <u>attendance@stmaryak.school.nz</u>, explaining the lateness. Once at school, students must sign in at the office.

## **LEAVE REQUESTS**

For three days or less a letter/email needs to be submitted to your daughter's Dean. For more than 3 days, a letter/email addressed to the Principal and your daughter's Dean must be submitted. When leave is acknowledged, a letter will be emailed to you.

## LOCKERS

Year 7-8 students are automatically allocated a locker, they are informed of their locker location and number during the first week of school. Year 9-13 students can hire a locker for \$10.00 for the year. This can be paid through OfficeMax Myschool, at the beginning of the school year only, or by contacting the accounts office accounts@stmaryak.school.nz. Once payment is received, locker numbers will be allocated, and an email will be sent out to confirm the locker number. Lockers are randomly allocated. We do not swap lockers unless there is a very good reason to do so, and this would need to be discussed with the Dean. Padlocks are not provided. We recommend a combination lock.

## **PASTORAL CARE CONCERN**

See your Dean, Deputy Principal - Ms Elena Grant, or any member of staff. The student planner/handbook also contains plenty of helpful information.

## **SCHOOL HANDBOOK**

Students in Years 7-10 will be issued with a school handbook/planner/diary at the beginning of the school year. This not only serves as a weekly term diary but also contains other essential information including prayers, daily timetables and code of conduct.

## **STATIONERY**

All stationery and workbook requirements for the new school year are listed on the OfficeMax Myschool website <u>https://www.myschool.co.nz/</u>. On the website please select St Mary's College, Ponsonby, then press 'view requirements list'. The 'go live' date for our school is early in January. OfficeMax Myschool is a convenient online and delivery service.



## **STUDENT ID CARD**

At the beginning of the year, students are issued with a student ID card. The ID card can be used for school printers, student discounts on public transport and student discounts for selected providers. ID cards can be initially registered by swiping at a photocopier. There is a top up, pay-in coin machine at the Library. Students should ensure that they have an adequate balance available for printing and copying as required.

## TIMETABLE

Each student will be given a copy of their timetable. To view it digitally, they can access their KAMAR portal. Parents can also see the timetable via the KAMAR Portal.

## **TUCKSHOP**

Our school tuckshop provides a variety of food at interval and lunch. The prices for tuckshop food are listed on a board beside the café.

## **UNIFORM PASSES**

On occasion, a student may have a good reason for not wearing part of the school uniform. A note must be brought from home, to the student's Dean and a pass will be issued for the day. If there are ongoing issues with uniform, please discuss this with the Dean. Deans will contact parents if a long-term uniform problem persists.

## WHERE DO I GO ON MY FIRST DAY AT SCHOOL?

Wear your school uniform. When you arrive, you will be met at the top of the drive by senior students and directed to the correct space. We will start with a liturgy for all new students and their families.

## WHAT DO I BRING ON MY FIRST DAY?

If you are in Year 7 you won't need all your books. Your daughter will need only morning tea, a drink bottle, packed lunch, refill pad/paper and pencil case. Student uniforms and any items brought to school should be clearly named.

Year 8 students, and any new students at Year 8-13, need to bring their devices on their first day of school in order for BYOD orientation to occur.

The school tuck shop will be open to purchase food items. We will send a reminder with all this information in mid-January.

#### <u>Year 7</u>

Year 7 students will study the following compulsory subjects:

Religious Education, English/English for Speakers of Other Languages (ESOL), Mathematics, Science, Health and Physical Education, Social Studies, Technology, Arts (Art, Music, Drama), Languages -Chinese, French, and Te Reo Māori

#### <u>Year 8</u>

Year 8 students will study the following compulsory subjects:

Religious Education, English/English for Speakers of Other Languages (ESOL), Mathematics, Science, Health and Physical Education, Social Studies, Technology, Arts (Art, Music, Drama),

AND 2 Languages from Chinese, French and Te Reo Māori

#### <u>Year 9</u>

All Year 9 students will study the following compulsory subjects:

Religious Education, English/English for Speakers of Other Languages (ESOL), Mathematics, Science, Social Studies, Health and Physical Education, Arts (including Music, Art, Drama), Technology (three trimester courses of Technology, Design & Visual Communication, Digital Technologies, and Fashion & Interior Design)

AND 1 Language from French, Chinese and Te Reo Māori

#### <u>Year 10</u>

All Year 10 students will study the following compulsory subjects:

Religious Education, English/English for Speakers of Other Languages (ESOL), Mathematics, Science, Social Studies, Health and Physical Education

**AND** 3 options from the following subjects:

Art, Business Studies, Chinese, Dance, Design and Visual Communication, Digital Technology, Drama, Fashion & Interior Design, French, Hauora and Sports Studies, Music, Te Reo Māori

#### Year 11, 12 and 13

All Year 11 students will study the following compulsory subjects:

Religious Education and one Mathematics Course (Mathematics **or** General Mathematics), English/English for Speakers of Other Languages (ESOL), and Science Course (Science **or** General Science) **AND** three other subjects of their choice.

All Year 12 students will study the following compulsory subjects: Religious Education and an English/English for Speakers of Other Languages (ESOL) Course **AND** five other subjects of their choice.

All Year 13 students will study Religious Education AND five other subjects of their choice.

## **SCHOOL HOUSES**

Each student is allocated to one of five houses for Sports and Cultural events. The houses, which are named after significant Mercy women in the history of the College are Dickson, Leo, Loreto, Maher and Leydon. Each House has a House Dean and two Year 13 Prefects to oversee activities and events throughout the year. Our House system fosters a sense of belonging, spirit, and participation. Students will be emailed their House in the new year.



## **SPORTS**

The College has a strong sporting tradition, and all students are encouraged to participate in at least one sport each year. The Director of Sport along with staff, parents and volunteers strive to offer a varied sports programme to cater for the different interests of our students. Students are expected to prioritise playing for the school while they are at the College. Parents are urged to support school teams and inter-school games.

## SCHOOL UNIFORM

St Mary's College has a high-level of expectation that all students will wear their uniform with pride. This means wearing the uniform correctly and taking personal presentation seriously. Students are required to wear the correct uniform, in the correct manner, between home and school. This includes a blazer, or school jacket in winter or shirt in the summer. It is expected that the uniform is clean, always ironed and is in good condition. Make-up and nail polish is not allowed.

#### **JUNIOR SCHOOL UNIFORM - YEAR 7-10**

Shirt

A school chambray blue, short sleeved shirt with our school emblem. There is also an optional chambray blue long sleeve shirt for the winter.



#### Skirt

Royal blue school skirt worn just above the knee

#### Cardigan

Navy blue school cardigan which zips up the front with the school emblem on it. NB Only to be worn at school.

#### Blazer

Royal blue with navy stripe blazer to be worn at school events, school assemblies in public.

#### **SENIOR SCHOOL UNIFORM – YEAR 11-13**

#### Shirt

A white, short sleeved shirt with the school emblem.

#### Skirt

Royal blue school skirt to be worn just above the knee. Navy full length school skirt to be worn in Year 12-13.

#### Cardigan

Navy blue zip up cardigan with the school emblem in Years 11-12. Year 13 - Red cardigan in Year 13. NB – Only to be worn at school.

Navy blazer to be worn at school events and school assemblies and in public.

#### Shoes

Year 7-11 plain black leather lace up school shoes in Term 1-4, but in Term 2 & 3 are compulsory (no sport shoes, heels, boots, canvas or beach shoes are allowed). This includes Chucks, Vans or similar)

#### Sandals

In Terms 1 & 4 students can wear black Roman sandals or "Safari" sandals (without socks)



#### Year 12-13

Flat plain black leather shoes covered toe without any decoration or ornamentation. No stitching on the shoes other than black. (No sport shoes, boots, heels, canvas or beach shoes are allowed).

#### Socks/Stockings

Year 7-11 Students may either wear the current fold over ankle socks or the short ankle socks. In Terms 2 & 3 black stockings (not knee highs)may be worn).

Year 12-13 Term 1 & 4 black ankle socks are required. Term 2 & 3 black stockings are to be worn.

#### PE Gear

Royal blue shirt and royal blue PE shorts. Plain sports shoes with non-marking soles and plain white ankle socks. A St Mary's College sports tracksuit may be worn.



#### Swimming Cap

A swimming cap is a compulsory item for PE (preferably in the house colour). Students will not gain access to the pool without wearing a cap, which can be purchased from the accounts office.



#### Swimsuit

Dark coloured, one-piece swimsuit.

#### Other Uniform Items:

Scarf - Plain navy blue or black scarf (optional in winter only)

Jacket - A regulation school jacket/anorak in winter is available (optional)

Umbrella - School umbrella (optional)

Raincoat - Plain, navy-blue raincoat may be worn over the blazer outside in wet weather


Hair - Hair which is shoulder length or longer must be tied back.

Natural hair colour only. Students may wear plain navy or black ribbons (Year 7-12 Blue and Year 13 red). Narrow blue or black headbands. Elastic hair tie.

Jewellery - One small, metal, stud earring in the lower lobe of each ear. No pearls, diamantes, nose studs or sleepers. A small crucifix or cultural taonga may be worn. No other jewellery to be worn.

Each international student has a buddy in their classes and the support of an international ambassador, who helps students join clubs, sports and to integrate into St Mary's school life.

St Mary's College is looking for caring families to host our school's international students. This could be of interest if you have a spare room and would love to learn about new cultures. If you live in one of the surrounding areas of school, live near a city bound bus route or come into school via one of the designated school buses, we would love to hear from you. 
